The past few months have brought with them exciting developments for the shelter, including the receipt of generous grants from the **Petco Foundation** and **The J. Edwin Treakle Foundation**. We welcomed aboard new team members, and two current team members transitioned to new roles. We celebrated our life-saving partners during Family Fun Day and revamped our approach to volunteer recruitment.

During 2Q19 and *together*, we helped 124 pets find their forever homes, transferred in 86 homeless pets from shelters approaching critical capacity and transferred 121 homeless pets to our adoption-guaranteed partners through our Highway to Home program. These successes are the direct result of your heart for homeless pets and generosity for our cause. It is my sincere hope that you share in the sense of accomplishment we feel when reflecting on the past few months.

The GMHS family—donors, volunteers and team members—fill our shelter with light, love and hope. As you well know, for many of the pets who enter our care, we offer their first positive encounter with people. Throughout this issue, you'll find stories of the transformative power offered by all of those with whom we partner.

I also hope you feel inspired as you read further, for there are more lives to be saved. There are more homeless pets and community members still to benefit from the special brand of joy we bring to our life-saving efforts. And, we'll do so together!

Highway to Home Update

GMHS received a \$15,000 grant from the Petco Foundation to help fund our Highway to Home transport program. The generous support of the Petco Foundation helps homeless pets benefit from the transport partnerships we share with 39 adoption-guaranteed agencies. Since the March 1, 2019, grant award, 174 homeless pets have benefited from the program.

Doggo (below) is just one of the 121 pets who found their Highway to Home during 2Q19. He was among three dogs on the June 17 transport to the **SPCA of Hancock County** (Maine). Doggo entered the care of GMHS in August 2018 and was adopted fewer than 48 hours after his arrival in Maine!



Staffing

If you have visited the shelter recently, you've likely noticed some new faces as well as familiar faces in new roles. Below is an overview of some of the recent changes:

- **Amy Willoughby** has transitioned to the GMHS' humane educator role from the Behavior Team. She spends her time in the community and around the shelter, educating individuals and groups about animal care and behavior and responsible pet ownership.
- Waynette Petty has been named GMHS' volunteer coordinator. She is responsible for the management of all aspects of the volunteer program, including community service and Helping Hands volunteers, and continues to offer adoption and animal care support.
- **Anne-Sophie Marchal**, LVT, has joined GMHS as a member of the shelter's Vet Care Team. She has 14 years' experience in veterinary clinics and is excited to work in shelter medicine.

Volunteer Program

We've heard your feedback and have been working hard to make volunteering at GMHS as accessible as possible. - The shelter's dryer is fastly approaching its end of life. GMHS recently received a \$4,000 grant from The J. Edwin Treakle Foundation toward the purchase of a new stackable gas dryer. One-third of the way toward our goal of \$11,500, \$7,500 is needed to fully fund the purchase of the dryer and to retrofit the space for it. - Kitten season is upon us! This is a time when the kittens and cats in our care consume an astounding amount of Purina Kitten Chow and use an enormous amount of non-clumping cat litter. GMHS Benefits from Eagle Scout Project

During spring 2019, Boy Scout **Aidan Wells** set out to improve the lives of the kennel team members and dogs living at GMHS. The Wells family and Boy Scouts of America Troop 111 engineered a brick walkway to help the team safely walk dogs across the yard and into the miles of walking trails.

Before Wells dedicated his Eagle Scout service project to GMHS, all 46 resident dogs at the shelter walked across a dirt and grass yard to access walking trails. Heavy, frequent foot traffic created ruts in the yard's dirt, making the ground uneven and difficult to navigate. Snow and ice also made the yard difficult to cross comfortably as salt could not be spread on the grass because it is harmful to dogs' paw pads. Morning dew on the grass would soak shoes and socks within minutes, and rainstorms easily turned the backyard into a mud pit.

GMHS Humane Educator Amy Willoughby states, "Walking the dogs in our care is extremely important to their emotional and physical well-being. Navigating the back yard before the walkway was installed was always a game of 'Did I wear the correct shoes today?' and 'Can I walk this dog safely to the trails in this weather?'"

The new walkway was constructed with durability and resourcefulness in mind. A level trench was first dug to eliminate the pooling of water in the yard. While the installation of pea gravel and rock underneath the brick path was costlier, it is also more effective for proper drainage. Wells recruited fellow Troop 111 members and other volunteers, borrowed equipment and recycled existing supplies at the GMHS animal shelter to reduce costs. Once the walkway was completed, the remainder of the gravel and rock was used to fill in holes in the GMHS driveway.

GMHS Board of Directors Member **Dr. Richard Crowder** served as technical and project advisor for the effort. Periodic meetings were held to discuss project planning and implementation of the large undertaking. A dedication sign was placed to commemorate Wells' contribution for the benefit of our community's homeless pets and their caregivers.

While a walkway may not be an obvious need at an animal shelter, it supports the quality of life for GMHS dogs and team members. Crowder says, "I believe this [project] epitomizes the lessons that participating in scouting brings. Our furry pals and the entire GMHS family are grateful."

From the bottom of all of our hearts—and pads of our puppy toes—GMHS thanks Wells, Troop 111 members, and their family and friends who helped install the walkway and make GMHS a safe harbor for homeless pets. And, our congratulations to Wells for earning the rank of Eagle Scout!
